Trillium-239 TMF Benefit Concert

Even though we had to cancel our January Tumbleweed Benefit Concert with Chainsaw! and the Fine Particulates and Big Joe, we still have more benefit concerts on the horizon. Our local divas Trillium-239 will be doing a concert on Saturday, March 16th at 7:30 pm in the sanctuary of All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1322 West Kimball Avenue in Richland. Enter through the downstairs door near the parking lot in the back of the church. Tickets are \$20 for general admission and \$15 for members at the door or purchased in advance online at http:// www.3rfs.org/concert.htm.

Trillium-239 is not a new element in the periodic table and it's not used in nuclear bombs or power plants. Trillium-239 is a familiar trio formerly known as Humphrey, Hartman and Cameron. While their old name sounded like a law firm, their current name combines a 3 petaled wildflower and an isotope of plutonium, historically produced on the Hanford site that was indirectly responsible for bringing each of the trio's members to Richland.

They are known for their complex melodies, quirky lyrics, award winning songwriting, and masterful arrangements. Cello, guitar, and banjo provide thoughtful support for their tight vocal harmonies.

Mary Hartman (banjo, guitar and vocals) finds inspiration in the sublime and the ridiculous. Her award-winning songs cover topics from love and mercy to goose poop. Recently retired from her

job as a hydrogeologist, she will have more time for songwriting, traveling, reading and her artistic hobby of making collage icons.

Janet Humphrey (guitar and vocals), who now lives in Sequim, was a transplant from the east coast and has a writing style that reflects her diverse musical background. She has done commercial musical arranging, fronted a jug band, moderated internet forums, and written memorable songs about historical topics and mundane activities like cleaning out the refrigerator.

Michelle Cameron is a versatile cellist, playing lines that are sometime lyrical, sometimes rhythmic and always interesting. Her cello adds a third voice to Janet and Mary's alto tones. When she is not playing with the trio or working as a chemist, Michelle often accompanies Hank Cramer and other shanty singers, and sometimes plays classical music.

Trillium-239's latest CD, <u>Rare Isotope</u>, features some of their more recently written songs. It also has a cover of Linda Allen's "Termination Winds", which was recently featured in a nationally distributed documentary "<u>Richland.</u>"

Don't miss this opportunity to see and hear our local divas live in concert, and also support <u>Tumbleweed Music</u> <u>Festival</u>, as all proceeds from the concert will go into the coffers to fund the festival. President's Pen -- by Gene Carbaugh

Occasionally one gets a rude awakening that helps prioritize and educate. A week ago I had one in the form of a heart attack that landed me in the hospital for four nights and days and added two metallic stents to my heart arteries. Dan Maher called me a greenhorn because I only have two whereas he and a couple of performers we know have several more. First I will share my experience because many of you are aware this happened, and there are valuable lessons from it for all.

About 30 minutes after dinner I felt what I called mild pain in my chest that was a bit different in feel and location from heartburn. Certainly not excruciating or incapacitating to my thinking or activity - I was going to leave for my weekly folk dancing activity in another 30 minutes. But walking up the stairs I felt just a touch light-headed, again, not an uncommon experience when one is on blood pressure medication. Maybe a bit warm, certainly not profuse sweating. The clincher was an irregular heartbeatskipping about every fourth beat. I had my wife Susan double check my pulse

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and for her, that was a clincher that we should go to the Emergency Room. I had been pondering that a bit, but the symptoms seemed so minor and tolerable that I was hesitating slightly. Yielding to my wife's judgement, we drove the mile to the hospital, not bothering to call for an ambulance, and I filled out the admission form. To keep the story short, within 15 minutes I was bumped to the head of the long waiting line and being checked by the nurse who, within 5 minutes, had me in a wheelchair rushing me to a room where the cardiac response team quickly prepped me for the heart catheter lab. Within two hours of ER arrival, I was exiting the lab with a newly installed stent and my body pumped full of blood thinners. The next day a second stent was installed, and I learned that I had experienced a STEMi myocardial infarction (a.k.a., heart attack) that is known in medical circles as a "widowmaker" because of the high mortality rate if not rapidly treated. When I think over what I considered at the time to be relatively minor, inconveniencing symptoms, the outcome could have been very different if not for my wife's insistence. It would have been easy to have not said anything to her and just gone on with my planned evening of folk dancing, probably with catastrophic consequences. The lesson learned is to pay attention to those seemingly minor body reactions, listen to your advisors, and don't hesitate to act because you think you might be inconveniencing others over nothing. So that's my "education" lesson.

Now for the "priority" lesson. While in the hospital, the importance of continuity of organization weighed on me for 3RFS. We have a remarkable organization that has been successfully putting on concerts, coffee houses, singalongs, dances (though not so often since Covid) and the Tumbleweed Music Festival for 28 years and more. To continue, we must have new people in leadership roles - people who may have a vision different from the traditional vision most of us have. We need younger people to boldly step up and help us see ways and activities to attract their peers. We need the elder members as leaders to remind us of our valued traditions. We need the courage to hand over the reins of leadership. The 3RFS

board recognizes this need and seeks your consideration in finding people to step into new roles. Without such changes, 3RFS could slowly wither away. How might you be a part of fulfilling this need? I'll be writing more on this in future President Pens.
